

# Inventorying the Manuscripts of Venice’s Biblioteca Nazionale Marciana (Before and) After Zanetti

## Notes on the Zanetti Draft, the Zanetti Appendices, and the ‘New’ and ‘Present’ Appendices to Zanetti

**Abstract** The present study traces the documented history of cataloguing the manuscript fonds of Venice’s Biblioteca Marciana, and in particular the Latin and Romance manuscript fonds, drawing from official sources (such as Anton Maria Zanetti’s published catalogues [1740-41] and the *Appendice a Zanetti*), from published and unpublished pre-Zanetti sources, and from published and, most importantly, unpublished post-Zanetti sources. A particular inventory of early Marciana manuscripts not described in the Zanetti catalogues is brought to light and compared with entries in the later *Appendice a Zanetti*. Additional findings on cataloguing the French corpus are revealed.

**Keywords** Biblioteca Marciana. Venice. Latin, Italian, and French manuscripts. Manuscript catalogues. Anton Maria Zanetti.

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## 1 Introduction: Catalogues of the Manuscript Fonds of Venice's Biblioteca Marciana

The Biblioteca Nazionale Marciana in Venice houses an important collection of old Greek, Latin, Italian, and French manuscripts that came into the possession of the library through the bestowment of various private collections over the course of several centuries, most notable of which – aside from Francesco Petrarca's mythical foundational donation of 1362 (Zorzi 1987, 13; 1988, 16)<sup>1</sup> – Cardinal Bessarion's 1468 gift of 482 Greek and 256 Latin manuscripts (Zorzi 1987, 83).<sup>2</sup> After the delivery in 1713 of Jacopo Contarini's bequest decreed some 118 years earlier (Zorzi 1987, 247), and then the acceptance of Giambattista Recanati's vast library upon his death in 1734 (Zorzi 1987, 250), the Marciana finally endeavoured to catalogue the entirety of its manuscript patrimony systematically. In 1736, the recently installed *bibliotecario*, Lorenzo Tiepolo, having overseen the successful process of cataloguing the library's statuary in two printed volumes, swiftly re-engaged the author of said volumes, Anton Maria Zanetti (soon after to assume the role of the library's *custode*) and his collaborator Antonio Bongiovanni to commence a similar operation regarding the Marciana's ample manuscript collection (Zorzi 1987, 262). By 1740, the first of two volumes ultimately dedicated to the project came off the presses, in which all of the library's known Greek codices were registered and described;<sup>3</sup> a year later the second volume, devoted to the collection's Latin, Italian, and French manuscripts, also came to fruition.<sup>4</sup>

The catalogues were initially praised upon their publication. Future *custode* and *bibliotecario* Iacopo Morelli recounts in his 1774 *Della pubblica libreria di San Marco in Venezia* the volumes' reception among the general public and within the Republic's governing circles upon publication:

riuscì pertanto gratissimo al Pubblico il nuovo Indice; lodi e grazie riportò il Senato per avere comandata opra sì bella; ed onore e stima ne acquistarono i compilatori per l'erudizione dimostrata, per la diligenza, che usarono in questo lavoro, e per la moderazione da essi serbata nell'inserirvi soltanto ciò, che opportuno era a propriamente rappresentare i Codici a' leggitori [...]. Le quali cose mossero anche il Senato a premiare i benemeriti Zanetti, e Bongiovanni con una medaglia d'oro di conveniente grandezza. (LI-LII)

Rinaldo Fulin, almost a century later, confirms Morelli's account of the catalogues' eighteenth-century reviews:

Quando il Bongiovanni ed il Zanetti ebbero compiuto quel tentativo [...], il *Giornale dei Letterati* di Firenze [sic], le *Novelle Letterarie* di Venezia [sic; I suspect that Fulin intended to write "*Giornale dei Letterati di Venezia*" and "*Novelle Letterarie di Firenze*"], la *Storia letteraria* del Zaccaria, i *Nuovi Atti degli eruditi* di Lipsia lo levarono a cielo; la Repubblica di S. Marco ne fece l'edizione a sue spese, e all'uno e all'altro compilatore donò una medaglia d'oro espressamente coniata.

But, he notes, the good vibes were scarcely warranted:

E tuttavia si notava che il Bongiovanni e il Zanetti erano molto lontani da quella accuratezza che deve essere nota caratteristica d'un eccellente catalogo: troppo importanti codici dimenticati nell'opera essi rilegano in Appendice: non danno sempre notizie sugli autori men noti, sugli amanuensi, sull'età, sui caratteri di ciascun manoscritto; un codice membranaceo talora dicono cartaceo, talora un cartaceo trasformano in membranaceo; s'ostinano qualche volta in analisi minuziose, o più spesso accennano con insufficiente brevità i manoscritti; non di rado sbagliano il numero che contrassegna ogni codice, il nome dell'autore, l'indicazione dell'opera la quale stimano talora compiuta quando non è, e non avvertono invece quando molte e diverse operette si leggono in un medesimo codice. (Fulin 1868, 193)<sup>5</sup>

As referenced by Fulin, to address the omissions ("troppo importanti codici dimenticati") and to correct the errors that had plagued the Zanetti catalogues, as well as to register the Marciana's subsequent

acquisitions, the *Appendice a Zanetti* was established.<sup>6</sup> The first undertaking of this effort is generally attributed to Pietro Bettio, initially under the guidance of Morelli, from 1795 to the middle of the next century (Valentinelli 1872, 23-4; Zorzi 1993, 40; Marcon 2017, 31);<sup>7</sup> however, the French Hellenist Jean-Baptiste-Gaspard d'Ansse de Villoison had already published in his *Anecdota græca e regia Parisiensi, et e Veneta S. Marci bibliothecis deprompta* (1781, 247-9)<sup>8</sup> the contents of a “new” appendix that Zanetti himself had penned “ad finem exemplaris sui Catalogi Codicum Græcorum, quod in S. Marci Bibliotheca servatur, hanc addidit Appendicem Manuscriptorum, qui post confectum Catalogum, in hanc Bibliothecam delati sunt” (247). It contains descriptions of 26 Greek manuscripts possessed by the Marciana but not registered in Zanetti's printed catalogue. The text at the source of d'Ansse de Villoison's published account of the Marciana's more recently acquired or otherwise neglected Greek manuscripts is the seldom-cited handwritten document titled “Appendix Nova Graecorum Codd. qui nuper in Bibliotheca predierunt”, located on the unnumbered pages [325-7] of the Marciana's MS Lat. XIV 110a (= 4531),<sup>9</sup> at the end of (as d'Ansse de Villoison indicates) a printed copy of Zanetti's catalogue.<sup>10</sup> A review of this “Appendix Nova” (hereinafter “App. Nova”) has helped to unearth a further, hitherto-unstudied, eighteenth-century record pertaining to the early scholarship devoted to the Marciana's numerous manuscript *fonds*.<sup>11</sup> This newly uncovered text constitutes yet another foundational document

attesting the early organization of the library's manuscript patrimony. I will introduce in this forum the particular source in question, and in so doing I will turn my focus toward the old Latin, Italian, and French manuscript collections, as well as toward documentation pertaining to these *fonds* composed both before and after the production of the Zanetti catalogues. Additionally, I will publish here as an appendix (fittingly!) the contents of the aforementioned rediscovered inventory and compare them to corresponding entries in Bettio's *Appendice a Zanetti*. I will begin, however, by sketching the complex network of appendices associated with the Zanetti project, defining two distinct main types: those printed as part of and found within the Zanetti publications, hereafter referred to as the "Zanetti appendices"; and those created subsequent to the Zanetti publications, hereafter called the "Appendices to Zanetti". I will then concentrate on the Latin and Romance indices and the appendix being brought to light here in a section titled "Further Exploration of Lesser-Known Material Concerning the Marciana's Old Latin, Italian, and French Manuscripts".

## 2      **Zanetti Appendices and Appendices to Zanetti**

### 2.1    **Zanetti Appendices**

Each of the two published Zanetti volumes dedicated to the Marciana's manuscripts contains "internal appendices" that serve to set certain manuscripts apart from the core of each of the collections, but that nevertheless form part of the publications and treat the works listed in the appendices as members of the greater collections. These "internal" appendices are what I refer to as the "Zanetti appendices", distinguished from those appendices that are "external" to, i.e. instituted after, the published Zanetti editions, the "appendices to Zanetti". The "appendices to Zanetti" are handwritten inventories, only parts of which have served as the basis for subsequent publications.

- 2.1.1      *Zanetti's Appendix Graecorum Codicum Ex Legato Jacobi Contareni, Jo. Bapt. Recanati Aliorumque and Appendix codicum, qui nuper in parte superiori ducalis ecclesiae inventi sunt*

The first of the internal “Zanetti appendices” is the “Appendix Graecorum Codicum Ex Legato Jacobi Contareni, Jo. Bapt. Recanati Aliorumque”, contained on pp. 289-317 of Zanetti (1740), with descriptions of codices numbered “CCCCXXXIV” to “DCXXV”. With this appendix, Zanetti withholds the most recent Greek acquisitions provening from the Contarini, Recanati, and other collections from the “class” system of organization to which the catalogue’s first 533 manuscripts – largely of Bessarionian origins – are assigned.<sup>12</sup> Zanetti and Bongiovanni<sup>13</sup> write of the appendix in the volume’s “Praefatio”, “Appendix volumen claudit, quae Codices, quos benemeriti Cives Jacobus Contarenus, & Joannes Baptista Recanati Patricii Venn. Aliiq. Reipublicae legaverunt, complectitur” ([iv]). The second internal appendix in my summary is the “Appendix codicum, qui nuper in parte superiori ducalis ecclesiae inventi sunt”, pp. 207-17 of Zanetti (1741) devoted to Latin and Romance codices, situated after the core Latin section and before the Italian one. To be precise, referenced in the title of this appendix are the so-called Petrarch manuscripts, ostensibly donated to the Libreria by the poet laureate himself in 1362 and then subsequently lost. The collection in question was rediscovered only in 1739 “in certa piccola stanza della basilica di san Marco vicina ai quattro cavalli” (Mutinelli 1841, 551), at which point the rest of the Zanetti catalogue was clearly in preparation for the press (Valentinelli 1872, 23-4). Zanetti supplements this appendix’s title with a note that cites an earlier published catalogue: “Ex his aliquot, quos scilicet asterisco signavimus, descriptsit Tomasinus in Biblioth. Ven. MSS. pag. 56” (Zanetti 1741, 207). Zanetti is here referring to Giacomo Filippo Tomasini’s *Bibliothecae venetae manuscriptae publicae & privatae quibus diuersi scriptores hactenus incogniti recententur* (1650), though the Tomasini volume that Zanetti references is actually a republished extract from an earlier Tomasini work (it was

originally printed in his *Petrarcha redivivus, integrum poetae celeberrimi vitam iconibus aere celatis exhibens. Accessit nobilissimae foeminae Laurae brevis historia* of 1635, pp. 68-72). According to Morelli, the Petrarch codices were

dimenticati sino verso all'anno 1635, quando Jacopo Filippo Tommasino di Padova, Letterato di buon gusto, e di molta erudizione, avendo posto mano ad illustrare le gesta, e la dottrina del Petrarca, e rintracciando di essi, fu avvertito da Benedetto Capello nostro Gentiluomo, che nella stanza suaccennata si ritrovavano. [...] D'essi però ne fu mandato l'Indice al Tommasino, che lo pubblicò nel *Petrarcha Redivivus* dove diede ragguaglio di questa scoperta, e nelle Biblioteche Venete manoscritte. Ma i Codici continuarono ad essere serbati in quella stanza sino all'anno 1739. in cui agli altri del Pubblico furono aggiunti, ed in miglior forma ridotti. (1774, V-VI)<sup>14</sup>

But Zanetti's internal Latin appendix is also composed of descriptions of new-acquisition manuscripts such as those bequeathed by Recanati in 1734. Of the 45 works listed, only eight have the asterisk directing the reader to the Tomasini index to which Zanetti refers; I have listed them below together with the apparent connections that Zanetti seems to have drawn with Tomasini's inventory, though some connections are questionable (N.B. Tomasini's entries ["Tom".] are not numbered, so I have indicated them with numbers in square brackets).<sup>15</sup>

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in parte superiori ducalis ecclesiae inventi sunt” (Zanetti 1741, 207-17); and 2) Mutinelli never explicitly attributes his “Nota D” to the Zanetti catalogue, from which it is clearly copied. Furthermore, the introduction to “Nota D” makes no mention of Tomasini's 1635 work *Petrarcha Redivivus* (which is referenced in the text) but rather of his 1650 “Biblioth. Ven. mss.”, i.e. the *Bibliothecae venetae manuscriptae publicae & privatae quibus diuersi scriptores hactenus incogniti recensentur*, p. 56. Mutinelli's original source for this information, Morelli 1774, vi, makes it clear that Tomasini's inventory was in fact published in two places (see Morelli quote above); a direct comparison reveals that but for a few abbreviations and abridgements, the 1635 and 1650 Tomasini versions are in fact the same.

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I would add to this list at least the following as a possible connection, though the Zanetti volume displays no asterisk for this entry:

I have given here an account of the two appendices meant to complete the core Greek and Latin collections before the Zanetti editions hit the press. What follows is an overview of another appendix published in the second Zanetti volume (1741), which, however, amounts to its own catalogue rather than to a supplement to an already-established one. The importance of this last internal Zanetti appendix, dedicated to the Marciana’s original French and Gallo-Romance manuscript collection, warrants some more detailed commentary on particular points.

### 2.1.2 The “Appendice di alcuni manoscritti in lingua francese antica” (“App. Fr. Ant.”)

The third of the “Zanetti appendices” printed within the Marciana’s published catalogues of its manuscripts, the “Appendice di alcuni manoscritti in lingua francese antica” (hereinafter “App. Fr. Ant.”) occupies pp. 256-60 of Zanetti (1741) (after the section “Biblioteca de’ manoscritti italiani”). It is an “appendix” only to the extent that it constitutes an additional (and by far the smallest) portion of a volume ostensibly aimed at providing descriptions for only Latin and Italian manuscripts, for nowhere in the volume’s title, *Latina et italicica D. Marci Bibliotheca codicum manu scriptorum per titulos digesta*, is the French language ever referenced. It too, more so than even the Latin “Appendix codicum, qui nuper in parte superiori ducalis ecclesiae inventi sunt” before it, describes manuscripts that in large part had belonged to Contarini and to Recanati, which had only in the previous quarter century or so come into possession of the Marciana. It is an account of 25 codices composed in French or in a related Gallo-Romance idiom, and constitutes the most integral collection of medieval French manuscripts that were largely composed or copied in Italy, and that consequently exhibit considerable influence from the native Northern Italian vernaculars of their authors and scribes.<sup>16</sup> It is in fact precisely this French-Italian

linguistic admixture that has come to characterise these codices,<sup>17</sup> and that has drawn significant attention to the collection from international scholars dating back to the mid nineteenth century. The assemblage of these works forms a corpus that has been labelled by various scholars as “Franco-Venetian”, “Franco-Lombard”, or, perhaps most widespread now, simply “Franco-Italian”.

The manuscripts inventoried in “App. Fr. Ant.” form what is now referred to as the Marciana’s “Fondo francese antico”. As will be discussed below, this is in fact the Marciana’s only *fonds* entirely dedicated to French (or Gallo-Romance) codices, for the portion of the *Appendice a Zanetti* – i.e. the still-open appendix to Zanetti – in which the Marciana’s remaining French works are catalogued is now designated as the “Fondo stranieri”: the *fonds* to which all manuscripts acquired or (re)discovered after the publication of Zanetti and composed in Western European languages other than Greek, Latin, or Italian have been ascribed.<sup>18</sup>

I will take this opportunity to dedicate a few words to some aspects of the composition of the Fondo Francese Antico based on Zanetti’s “App. Fr. Ant”. The manuscripts described therein that have garnered perhaps the most attention from scholars as a sub-corpus unto itself are those that regard the *chansons de geste*, and in particular Charlemagne and Roland’s foray into Iberia. Zanetti’s catalogue gives us five descriptions of such manuscripts: those regarding MSS Fr. 4, 5, 6, 7, and 21. It is worth reproducing these Zanetti entries here for initial analysis:

Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle, Romanzo in versi, differente dal sovraccennato.

Of particular note is the similarity in the description of MSS Fr. 4-7, which all appear to describe versions of the *Chanson de Roland* ("Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle, Romanzo in versi"). What differs is 1) the declaration of "difference" between each of the latter two manuscripts ("differente dal sovraccennato" [Fr. 6] and "È diverso dagli altri due descritti di sopra" [Fr. 7]) and the ones described before them; 2) a comment on some codicological detail in one (Fr. 6) and not the others; and 3) a difference in number of folios between each codex. By chance, it must seem, MSS Fr. 5 and 7 appear to have the same number of folios! That is, however, not the case – there is in fact no Fr. 5 as described in "App. Fr. Ant". The description given is about as generic as possible, and appears to be a copy of that dedicated to Fr. 7 (which does have 140 folios) (Bisson 2008, 31), except that Fr. 5 is said to be in quarto and not in octavo. It is probable that Zanetti crafted this description with the conviction that the Marciana possessed another such manuscript, but without having it or any reliable notes about it at hand, except perhaps some inventories that had been commissioned while the manuscripts still resided with Giambattista Recanati.<sup>19</sup> In these older documents one can find early testimonies of each of the Marciana's extant codices pertaining to Charlemagne and Roland in Iberia, as well as those of manuscripts once in the possession of Recanati that did not enter into the Marciana's collection. Among the latter are testimonies of what would become the Bibliothèque Municipale de Châteauroux's

MS B 225, the “Châteauroux *Chanson de Roland*”. Zanetti prefaces his “App. Fr. Ant.” with some words on the history of the “French” body of manuscripts that he is cataloguing: “Degna di essere pubblicata è l’istoria di questi pregevoli Manuscritti, che furono riposti nella nostra Libreria per testamento di Giovambatista Recanati. Gli ebbe quell’illustre letterato dallo spoglio della Casa Gonzaga” (1741, 256). It is reasonable to conjecture that his familiarity with the history of many of these manuscripts, as well as with the history of Recanati’s collection, may have led Zanetti to presume that this other *Roland* manuscript – the one now housed in Châteauroux – which had recently been inventoried among Recanati’s possessions, twice, must have made its way into the treasures of the Marciana. He had little to go on except that it had to do with a “Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle” in verse and that it was in quarto, as those are the details presented in the Recanati catalogues.<sup>20</sup> So he applied “in 4°” to the same generic description that he had assigned to other supposed *Roland* codices,<sup>21</sup> but he borrowed the number of folios that is given in the description dedicated to Fr. 7. The confusion is rooted in the fact that, shortly before Recanati’s death, the Venetian nobleman had negotiated with Jacopo Soranzo the transfer of some of his manuscript collection. The last inventory compiled of Recanati’s collection before the bibliophile’s death was composed by Giannantonio Verdani, who was Soranzo’s personal librarian (Bisson 2008, XIV; Rossi 1930, 253-4). That inventory catalogued 24 French titles among Recanati’s treasures. But upon Recanati’s death and the transfer of his remaining manuscripts to the Marciana, a brief list (of no codicological value) was drawn up, in which only 23 French manuscripts were attested. It would appear that only one of the 103 manuscripts that Soranzo had claimed from the Recanati collection was “French”, and that it was indeed MS C of the *Chanson de Roland* now preserved in the library of Châteauroux (Bisson 2008, XIV): Marjorie Moffat (2014) notes that the Châteauroux manuscript is described in entry CCXLV of Soranzo’s catalogue, Vol. III, Section II, from 1746 (*Catalogo de’ manoscritti in-4°: Comincia dal CCXI fino al CCCC. A’ di 14 settembre 1746. Fatto da me Francesco Melchiori da Oderza*) (64).<sup>22</sup>

Vittorio Rossi's 1907 study of the Soranzo library, in part catalogued by the same Verdani, but mostly by Francesco Melchiori, highlights the fact that one of Soranzo's French manuscripts, a *Chanson de Roland* (MS 245), "migrò oltr'alpe" and that, having been possessed by Louis XVI before the Revolution, is now housed in the Châteauroux collection (Rossi 1930, 269). In a later article, Rossi addresses the codex in greater detail, connecting it with no. 52 of the 1407 Gonzaga inventory.<sup>23</sup> The early-fifteenth-century index describes a manuscript with the incipit "Carle roys a le barbe grifagne" and explicit "auter iour de mort resusistenz" (Braghirolli 1880, 513). Soranzo's own catalogue relays the beginning and end as, "Charlle li rois alabarbe grifaigne Sit anz toz plenz a este en espaigne Conquis" and "Et auterz iour de mort resuscitez" (Rossi 1930, 284). In the last Recanati inventory compiled in his lifetime (i.e. the Verdani inventory), this manuscript is described in the second entry, with similar details. In sum, Zanetti seems to have provided in his published catalogue a description ostensibly for "Fr. 5" that in fact pertains to a manuscript not residing among those in the Marciana's treasures at the time, and can instead be reasonably attributed to that which is now the Bibliothèque Municipale de Châteauroux's MS B 225.

Does the bizarre error laid out in the previous paragraph suggest then that there is no physical Fr. 5? The answer is no, there is a manuscript with that physical collocation (now labelled as the Marciana's MS 250); its contents just do not resemble the description given to it in Zanetti's Catalogue. Which point might lead to another reasonable assumption: that a description must not have been generated for the real Fr. 5 (= 250) at all. But that would not be entirely true either. Let us pass to Zanetti's description of Fr. 6 first for further analysis.

MS Fr. 6 (= 226) does not contain a *Chanson de Roland*, but rather the *Passion du Christ* and a *Chanson d'Aspremont*. As will be discussed in greater detail below, Zanetti's "App. Fr. Ant." is completely different from the French section that one reads in the volume's ostensible draft (hereafter, "Zan. Draft", which will be explored further below), which Tiepolo erroneously characterised as "complet-ed" around 1740.<sup>24</sup> In fact, very little of what appears in the French

portion of “Zan. Draft” appears in the published “App. Fr. Ant”.<sup>25</sup> For the codex that is now Fr. 6 (= 226), “Zan. Draft” had the following lengthy description:

Codice I in carta pecora, di fogli 69 in fog. molto ben conservato, del secolo decimo quarto.

LA PASSIONE di Cristo, Poemetto senza nome di Autore. Incomincia:

Apres la passe quand Jesus dure paine, ec.

ROMANZO delle battaglie di Roncisvalle [in versi] senza nome di Autore. Incom:

Qui voyt entendre voyre çançon,

Dagli ultimi versi si comprende essere stato scritto questo Codice l'anno MCCCLXXI.

We see in “App. Fr. Ant”. traces of this description, which are indicated in italics in the reproduction of the entry below:

*Codice VI in foglio, di carta pecora, di fogli 69.*

Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle, Romanzo in versi, differente dal sovraccennato.

*Nel fine si legge essere stato scritto il Codice nel MCCCLXXI. addì XX. di Giugno.*

The published “App. Fr. Ant”. entry provides the same information as the first half of the first line and the entirety of the last line of the entry in “Zan. Draft”. The rest of the draft entry has been completely omitted. As for the part in the middle of the published account, i.e. the (yet another) generic description of the *Chanson de Roland*? Well, it is inaccurate, but it was intended to be applied to the actual Fr. 5 (= 250), discussed just above. This codex, Fr. 5 (= 250), actually contains an original work, the *Prise de Pampelune*, also known as the *Continuazione dell'Entrée d'Espagne*. Still not a *Chanson de Roland*, but not far off from a “Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle”. But what could possibly give me the impression that this formula in the description that Zanetti applied to Fr. 6 (= 226) was instead destined for Fr. 5 (= 250), and that the one that actually appears in the description of Fr. 5 was applied erroneously? It has to do with what follows the generic description: the entry for Fr. 6 reads, “Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle, Romanzo in versi, *differente dal sovraccennato*” (italics mine). As has been explored in another forum, Zanetti’s published catalogue of French works differs so greatly from his draft because it was remade after consultation with the French scholar Jean-Baptiste de La Curne de Sainte-Palaye around

1740, whose notes on the matter survive to this day.<sup>26</sup> One particular codex housed at the Marciana contains a formally penned document titled “*Notices des manuscrits françois de la Bibliothèque de St.-Marc à Venise*”, which is an almost-word-for-word equivalent of what is published in Zanetti’s “*App. Fr. Ant.*”, only in French, and believed to be the link between Sainte-Palaye’s personal notebooks and the published Zanetti catalogue.<sup>27</sup> The only real differences are 1) that a few manuscripts described in Zanetti are neglected in Sainte-Palaye’s “*Notices*”; and 2) the order in which they are listed differs between the two. The issue of the order is particularly relevant in backing up my assertions. Below, I will reproduce again the *four* descriptions in the Zanetti edition that contain the words “Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle, Romanzo in versi” (Fr. 4-7), and will give more recent (and more accurate) codicological information in the notes:

Codice IV in foglio, di carta pecora, di fogli 97.

Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle, Romanzo in versi.<sup>28</sup>

Codice V in 4° di carta pecora, di fogli 140.

Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle, Romanzo in versi.<sup>29</sup>

Codice VI in foglio, di carta pecora, di fogli 69.

Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle, Romanzo in versi, differente dal sovraccennato.

Nel fine si legge essere stato scritto il Codice nel MCCCLXXI. addì XX. di Giugno.<sup>30</sup>

Codice VII in 8° di carta pecora, di fogli 140.

Carlo Magno, ovvero la Rotta di Roncisvalle.

È diverso dagli altri due descritti di sopra.<sup>31</sup>

Of note is that the third (Fr. 6) of the four claims to be “differente dal sovraccennato”; but which “sovraeccennato”, Fr. 4 or 5? There are two! The fourth (Fr. 7), then, claims to be “diverso dagli altri *due* descritti di sopra” (emphasis mine); but which *two*? There are three! As it turns out, no, there are not. Sainte-Palaye orders his descriptions by letter. Zanetti’s Fr. 4 is Sainte-Palaye’s letter *p*; Zanetti’s Fr. 5 is Sainte-Palaye’s letter *r*; and Zanetti’s Fr. 7 is Sainte-Palaye’s letter *t*. As I mention above, Sainte-Palaye provided no description for what would end up being Zanetti’s Fr. 6 (= 226), but did provide one for what would end up being Zanetti’s Fr. 5 (= 250); Zanetti, apparently confused by this lacuna, however, applied Sainte-Palaye’s description of Fr. 5 to Fr. 6, though he added to it some distinguishing information that he had composed for his initial draft (which was something he seldom did, except in those cases where there was no account supplied by Sainte-Palaye and so he was constrained to draw from his original text) (see Reynolds [2012], 210-11; *corrigenza* 101, 105-6). So Sainte-Palaye’s *r* refers to what is now Fr. 5 (= 250) but the description in *r* has been (mis)appropriated for the description of Zanetti’s Fr. 6 (= 226). Observe (N.B. the numbers in superscript in the following table are not footnote markers, but rather part of the transcribed text):

Working backwards, it is clear that in Sainte-Palaye’s letter *t*, the clause “differend des deux ci dessus marquez p. et r.”, is the source of Zanetti’s Fr. 7 description, in which one reads “È diverso dagli altri due descritti sopra”; and it is fairly clear that in Sainte-Palaye’s

letter *r*, the clause “differend de celui ci dessus marqué p”. is the source of Zanetti’s Fr. 6 description, in which one reads “differente dal sovraccennato” – it is just that Zanetti does *not* reference the one still to come in his catalogue, whereas Sainte-Palaye does (“differend de celui ci dessus marqué p. et de celui ci après marqué t”). (emphasis mine). Once one weeds out the “phantom” description ultimately applied to Fr. 5 (= 250) that, I claim, was hastily composed and for the most part copied from that created for Fr. 7 (= 251), it becomes clear that there are in fact only three – and not four – codices that are being compared to one another. Sainte-Palaye’s notes make sense; and Zanetti’s would too if there were no description for Fr. 5, or better, if the middle part of the description applied to Fr. 6 had been correctly applied to Fr. 5 and no phantom description for it elaborated.

As for the fifth manuscript of the group initially highlighted above (Zanetti’s Fr. 21), it is not a *Chanson de Roland*, but another original story pertaining to Charlemagne in Iberia: the *Entrée d’Espagne*. Zanetti’s account of it (after Sainte-Palaye’s) does not confuse it with the other manuscripts connected in one way or another to the *Chanson de Roland*. My inclusion of it in this group is rather due to its close relationship with Fr. 5 (the *real* Fr. 5, dubbed the *Continuazione dell’Entrée d’Espagne*), a relationship that is of both a textual and codicological nature.<sup>32</sup>

## 2.2 The Appendices to Zanetti

In addition to the distinction between the internal “Zanetti appendices” and the external “appendices to Zanetti”, a further division must be articulated among the latter: the chronologically older, closed “new” appendices to Zanetti (thusly coined because of their use of the Latin “nova” and “novissima” in their titles) and the still-open appendix ostensibly established by Bettio a half century after the publication of the Zanetti catalogues to account for new additions to the Marciana’s fast-growing manuscript collection, which I term the “present” appendix to Zanetti (though I will generally refer to it with its officious Italian title *Appendice a Zanetti*, except where it is necessary to refer to particular divisions within).

## 2.2.1 The (Closed) “New” Appendices to Zanetti

## 2.2.1.1 The “Appendix Nova Graecorum Codd. qui nuper in Bibliotheca predierunt”

Though preserved among the Marciana’s Latin *manuscript* collection, MS Lat. XIV 110a is in fact a *printed* copy of Zanetti’s 1740 catalogue *Graeca D. Marci Bibliotheca codicvm manv scriptorvm per titulos digesta* discussed above, whose collocation among the manuscripts is doubtless attributable to the handwritten addition of the important, though long-forgotten, “Appendix Nova Graecorum Codd. qui nuper in Bibliotheca predierunt” (hereinafter “App. Nova”). The “App. Nova” is introduced on p. 323 at the end of the printed text by a handwritten sentence, “Segue una nuova Appendice”, and is very much a continuation of the published Greek catalogue, to the extent that it commences from the codex numbered DCXXVI (DCXXV is the last one printed in the Zanetti catalogue) and runs until codex DCLIV. Bettio appears to have added at some point the provenance of most of the manuscripts described in “App. Nova”, as he did for many of the entries in various catalogues and inventories, some of which have been made readily accessible online.<sup>33</sup>

This handwritten document is likely the first record of manuscripts compiled after the publication of Zanetti’s catalogues. It is not dated, but there are some indications of when it may have been composed. D’Ansse de Villoison’s account was published in 1781 following a three-year sojourn in Venice with daily visits to the Marciana (d’Ansse de Villoison 1781b, 25). But we have an even-earlier *terminus ante quem*: next to the third-last description in the “App. Nova” (DCLII, on the unnumbered p. [327]), one reads a handwritten note in the margins: “Questo libro fu portato in Libreria da un Gentiluomo, che avendolo lasciato qui per dodici anni e più, morì: nè alcuno venne più a dimandarlo. Si è posto negli Armari oggi 2 Maggio, 1761 dopo d’averlo fatto legare come gli altri” (emphasis mine). This note does not appear to be part of the original composition, and therefore does not indicate when the appendix itself was composed, other than to say that the appendix (or at least this much of it) was there in existence already by 2 May 1761. This would support the hypothesis that it must likely have been the work of Zanetti himself, who remained the Marciana’s *custode* from his 1737 engagement until

his death in November 1778 (Zorzi 1987, 262).<sup>34</sup> An additional note, seemingly of the same hand on the same page, next to a crossed-out description of “Codex DCLII [...] Pentateuchum Hebraicum”, further supports this position: it describes this codex as “non posto” among the collection’s manuscripts “per essere imperfettissimo; anzi levato per ordine di S.E. Proc. Tiepolo”. Lorenzo Tiepolo, who, as mentioned above, oversaw the composition and publication of the catalogues of manuscripts, died in 1742, the year after the second of the two Zanetti volumes had seen the light. This indication may suggest that this appendix was written very shortly after the Greek manuscript volume’s 1740 publication, in time for the physical manuscript described (“Codex DCLII [...] Pentateuchum Hebraicum”) to have been removed by Tiepolo’s orders before his passing. In other words, if the volume was removed as per Tiepolo’s request, then it is unlikely that it would have been included in an inventory composed after the *bibliotecario*’s death, only to be subsequently crossed out. Finally, with the assistance of the kind and helpful staff in the Marciana’s Sala manoscritti, I have determined that indeed both the careful script of the “App. Nova” up to the description of Cod. DCLII and the more idiosyncratic writing of the marginal notes analysed match that of Zanetti’s autograph texts.<sup>35</sup> There are two more entries after Cod. DCLII that have been written in a slightly different style, if not a different hand. I cannot determine in whose hands these are written. The description of Cod. DCLIV has a crossed-out note underneath it and then another note next to that, both of which are written in Morelli’s hand.<sup>36</sup>

2.2.1.2 The “Appendix Novissima [Latinorum] Codicum  
Manuscriptorum qui nuper in Bibliotheca inventi sunt”

If MS Lat. XIV 110a (= 4531) is a printed copy of Zanetti's Greek manuscript catalogue with a handwritten appendix placed at the end of it (“App. Nova”), it should come as no surprise that MS Lat. XIV 110b (= 4532)<sup>37</sup> might be a printed copy of Zanetti's Latin and Italian (as well as French) manuscript catalogue, *Latina et italicica D. Marci Bibliotheca codicum manu scriptorum per titulos digesta*, with similar supplemental information contributed. In fact, on the hand-numbered pages 269-79 that follow the last printed pages of this copy's index, one finds inserted by pen an “Appendix Novissima Codicum Manuscriptorum qui nuper in Bibliotheca inventi sunt” (hereinafter “App. Novissima”).<sup>38</sup> Unlike in the Greek “App. Nova”, whose codices are numbered as a true continuation of the published catalogue, i.e. from DCXXVI to DCLII, in the “App. Novissima” of Latin and Italian manuscripts, the numbering restarts at I and continues to LXXII. The first roughly two-thirds of the descriptions regard Latin manuscripts with details provided in Latin, while the latter third regards mostly Italian manuscripts, with information largely divulged in Italian. The hand of the first 54 entries is the same as that found in “App. Nova”, i.e. Zanetti's; the remaining entries were added subsequently and appear to have been written by Morelli, Zanetti's successor.

It is known that Morelli undertook to redo or to expand on Zanetti's work, and that the famed Venetian librarian would serve as mentor to another renowned Marciana librarian, Pietro Bettio. One must look no further than to Valentinelli's index of catalogues relative to the Marciana's collections to witness the scope of Morelli's endeavours in the service of the library. As mentioned above, Morelli had authored one of the earliest authoritative histories of the Marciana before serving in any official capacity there. Later, this time as a functionary of the institution in 1802, he published the *Bibliotheca manuscripta graeca et latina*, in which, according to Valentinelli, “L'autore rivide nella prima parte dell'opera (1-320) il lavoro di Zanetti e Bongiovanni, pubblicandone le correzioni e le giunte” (Valentinelli 1872, 22, entry 16), which Morelli would continue to do even after this volume would see the light (see entries 17-20 in Valentinelli 1872). Valentinelli remarks that what most stands out among Morelli's many personal writings pursuant to the errors and omissions that he found in the Zanetti catalogues are the “lettere autografe di

illustri contemporanei, co' quali il Morelli manteneva rapporti letterari" (Valentinelli 1872, 23, entry 19). Valentinelli further observes that his predecessor had fully intended to publish a new general catalogue, citing Morelli's own declaration, "La continuazione dell'indice dei mss. da farsi da me, è decretata dal senato con decreto che mi aumentò l'onorario, 1785, 28 giugno" (Valentinelli 1872, 23, entry 19). In addition to his work to document more amply public knowledge of the Greek manuscripts, Morelli dedicated copious energies to the Latin and other manuscripts as well (Valentinelli 1872, entries 24-5, 27, 34). Among Morelli's notes on the Latin and Romance ones, Valentinelli (1872) identifies in his entry 25 a series of "Studi autografi, ordinati ed ampliati dal Morelli sui codici latini illustrati dallo Zanetti, ch'egli apparecchiava alla stampa" (24).<sup>39</sup> It is here where one finds stitched among Morelli's writings the French-language inventory mentioned above, which has been attributed to Sainte-Palaye, that had likely served as the source for Zanetti's radically reimagined catalogue of the Marciana's French manuscripts compared to what appears in "Zan. Draft". And it is in the vicinity of this document among Morelli's papers that one finds the beginnings of the never-realised remake of the French catalogue. Though largely devoid of any substance, what little is included sheds some light on the errors and omissions of Zanetti's French catalogue, which I will explore in some detail below in section III.2, "The two 26th manuscripts of the Fondo Francese Antico".

But despite Morelli's greater philological prodigiosity, he never did achieve a lasting, cohesive, accessible accounting of all of the Marciana's insufficiently catalogued manuscripts. It was, instead, his protégé and successor Pietro Bettio who would take up the call and bring to fruition part of Morelli's vision by instituting the still-open *Appendice a Zanetti* (discussed in the next section). What we see with the "new" appendices to Zanetti - "App. Nova" and "App. Novissima" - is that Zanetti himself had lost no time in trying to remedy his catalogues' shortcomings shortly after having published his foundational volumes, and that there was a direct passing-of-the-baton, first from Zanetti to Morelli, and then from Morelli to Bettio.

After Zanetti's and Morelli's work on the "App. Novissima", Bettio appears to have done posterity an enormous favour by associating each manuscript description therein with its placement in the newly constituted *Appendice a Zanetti* with a small notation to the right of each of the titles in "App. Novissima".<sup>40</sup> This in itself must not

have been an onerous undertaking on Bettio's part, for a comparison of the "App. Novissima" and the *Appendice a Zanetti* clearly demonstrates that Bettio for the most part simply paraphrased or even copied directly into the latter the existing descriptions from the former, though assigning them to the different classifications ("classi") that had been established - based on those in Zanetti - for his new endeavour. A comparison of the entries in the "App. Novissima" and the corresponding entries in the *Appendice a Zanetti* (see appendix below) shows that most of the first 28 entries in the former, which record Latin codices, are identical or nearly identical in the latter; and that the vast majority of the rest of the descriptions in the "App. Novissima" (Italian between cods. XXIX and LXVII, excepting cods. XLII-XLIII, Latin again from LXVIII to LXXII) are very similar or at least in part identical. The *Appendice a Zanetti* indicates provenance and date of acquisition of many codices, information that is not generally included in the "App. Novissima" and that has been added subsequently to the initial composition of the *Appendice a Zanetti*. In a few cases, the "App. Novissima" will give a description of one text contained in the codex whereas the *Appendice a Zanetti* will provide further information pertaining to others contained within the same codex. For example, in description XVIII of the "App. Novissima", one reads "M. ANT. PEREGRINI Consilia. Vol. XI. comprehensa", while the *Appendice a Zanetti* gives headings to 11 different texts (MSS Lat. V 20-30). From descriptions XLV to LI in the "App. Novissima", there is a series of codices simply labelled "RACCOLTA di [x number] Opuscoli", wherein the first (XLV) is further described as "di vario genere. L'indice si trova nelle prime pagine; ma non è in tutti esattissimo", and each subsequent one described as merely "come sopra". The corresponding descriptions in the *Appendice a Zanetti* are far more fulsome, each one containing vast amounts of detail pertaining to each of the individual "opuscoli" (MSS Lat. XIV 46-51). The final description in the "App. Novissima" describes "Index Librorum, quos Bessario Cardinalis Nicensis dono dedit Ecclesiæ Sancti Marci Venetiarum, Duce et Senatum Venetiarum", followed by a note written in Italian, "Vi si aggiungono altri sette Indici vecchi e Registri dei Manoscritti e Libri della Libreria"; in the *Appendice a Zanetti*, each of these registers and old indices (of which there in fact seem to be nine) is described separately (MSS Lat. XIV 14-24). A pair of descriptions in the "App. Novissima" refer to codices described in neither the Latin nor the Italian sections of the *Appendice a Zanetti* (hereinafter "App. Lat". and "App. It". respectively). The description of Cod. XXIV in the "App. Novissima" has a note added to it that reminds the reader to the "Ind[ex] Codicum Arabicorum" (presumably the Marciana *Appendice a Zanetti*'s "Codices Arabici, Turcici, Persici et Sinenses, Coptici et Armeniaci, Hebraici, Indici ac Syriaci Etcaet" section - hereinafter "App. Or."); and the description of Cod.

XXXVII is supplemented with the later comment, “maintenant Cod. VIII.”, a reference to the eighth entry in the *Appendice a Zanetti*'s “Codici francesi e stranieri” section (“App. Str.”).<sup>41</sup> The description of Cod. LXIX in the “App. Novissima” is given as “Exstat cum Orosii Historia editionis Vincentinæ, per Hermannum de Colonia. | Leonardi Aretini de Bello Gothicò Libri IV”, with the added note “nunc. Cl. X. Cod. LXVI”. This entry in the *Appendice a Zanetti* was then struck through, ostensibly in 1904, with the explanation added, “è il codice CCLXXXVIII”, which entry then gives considerable description. Aside from the differences in the entries outlined here, the majority of the disparities between corresponding descriptions in the “App. Novissima” and the *Appendice a Zanetti* are minimal, are questions of formatting, or are due to subsequent annotation.

Whereas the Greek “App. Nova” gives us a clear *terminus ante quem* for at least a part of the index (see above), the Latin and Italian “App. Novissima” gives no such explicit data. For one thing, it is evident that this latter inventory was composed progressively, or in at least two parts (Codd. I-LIV and LV-LXXII), if not more. But more significantly, there is no mention of “oggi” in any marginal notation like there is in the Greek catalogue, so any date mentioned could easily refer to a past moment. For example, after the description of Cod. XLIV, one reads, “mandato in Libreria il dì. 18 agosto, 1748. dagli Ecc.<sup>mi</sup> Inquisitori di stato”, which neither proves that the index was begun after the 1748 reference, nor that *this entry* was provided in 1748, but rather that the entries XLIV forward must have been given in or after 1748 (if the marginal note is correct, of course). Another date is mentioned not much later in the “Appendix”: within the description for Cod. LII (i.e. *not* as marginalia), one reads “Donato alla pubblica libreria dal N.H.S.” Carlo Veronese il dì 21. Maggio, 1768”. This suggests that, at very least, entry LII and following could not have been created before 1768, but it says nothing of the date of creation of the entries before it. That said, there are stylistic elements that distinguish entries LI-LIV from the entries before them, and potentially LIII-LIV from LI-LII. One reads of codex LIII that it was “acquistato il dì 10. Marzo 1773”. Based on the superficial evidence, I would hazard to say that this appendix could have been compiled progressively throughout Zanetti's tenure as *custode* up to the description of Cod. LIV, and that he composed at least his last two entries between 1773 and his death in 1778, but likely the rest quite earlier. After codex LIV, the hand of the descriptions changes from Zanetti's to Morelli's.

2.2.2 The (Open) *Appendice a Zanetti*

The *Appendice a Zanetti* at present refers to a series of handwritten registers divided by language – including Greek, Latin, and Italian, as well as “Stranieri” (which in essence means Western European languages, and chief among them French) and “Orientali” (anything from Turkish to Amharic to Japanese) – cataloguing those codices not described in Zanetti’s original publications.<sup>42</sup> To be clear, what I am calling the *Appendice a Zanetti*, which, as noted above, was established in 1795 by Pietro Bettio, is in fact a more recent (and still-open) inventory than the “new” appendices, i.e. “App. Nova” and “App. Novissima” (which are now closed). Over the course of the last century and a half or so, various of the Marciana’s librarians and other scholars have endeavoured to publish in a more systematic fashion descriptions of some of the manuscripts otherwise only accounted for in the handwritten volumes of the *Appendice a Zanetti*. The “post-Zanetti” Greek, Latin, and Italian codices logged in the *Appendice a Zanetti* have been most methodically catalogued in several published works designated by language, in most cases together with those manuscripts whose descriptions were included in Zanetti’s original publications.<sup>43</sup> The “foreign” (*stranieri*) codices catalogued in the appendix have had no single integral published volume dedicated to them, though two catalogues have been devoted solely to the majority French manuscripts registered therein, with further studies given to those that make up Zanetti’s “Fondo Francese Antico”.<sup>44</sup> The

handwritten *Appendice* volumes of the Greek, Latin, Italian, and non-Western codices have been made available recently in digitised form online,<sup>45</sup> though at present the volume dedicated to the other Western European-language codices (or “*stranieri*”) remains consultable only in the Marciana’s manuscript reading room.

### **3      Further Exploration of Lesser-Known Material Pertaining to the Marciana’s Old Latin, Italian, and French Manuscripts**

#### **3.1    The Zanetti Draft (“Zan. Draft”)**

There is still another intriguing Zanetti-authored document related to the Latin, Italian, and French manuscripts that resides among the Marciana’s manuscript collection (referenced briefly above), which appears to be a handwritten “draft” of the final 1741 publication. Ample attention has been devoted to the final section of this work dedicated to the French manuscripts in other forums, so I will only remark on a few particular points in this space.<sup>46</sup> Suffice it to say that its contents differ substantially from those of the published catalogue, in all aspects thereof (prefaces, descriptions, order, and organization of descriptions, etc.) across languages. Of note is that “Zan. Draft” is preserved as MS Lat. XIV 110c (= 4533);<sup>47</sup> and it was the final designation – the “c” – that led me to investigate what connection, if any, this document had with MSS Lat. XIV 110a and 110b, which turn out to be the codices containing “App. Nova” and “App. Novissima” discussed above.

That these three codices have been bundled together in their call number appears to be due to the fact that they all concern the Zanetti catalogues: the first two being, as noted above, actual printed copies

of the Greek (110a) and Latin and Italian (110b) catalogues with important handwritten material contained in them significant enough to render them worthy of preservation among the manuscripts; and the third an actual handwritten work presumed by some, historically, to have been a final draft for what would be published a year later concerning the Latin and Italian (and French) manuscripts. It is interesting to note that originally, the *Appendice a Zanetti*'s "App. Lat". contained only one description for Lat. XIV 110, and it appears to be for what is now 110c: "BIBLIOTHECA Veneta Manuscripta Latina et Italica, cum Praefatione Antonii Mariae Zanetti, et Jacobi Vezzi. Codex exaratus anno MDCCXL". The original entry is labelled as "Cod. CX. Chart. in f.<sup>o</sup> Saec. XVIII", and a more recent hand added "B" after "Cod. CX" (which is now inaccurate), to which an even-more recent hand has pencilled in "e CX<sup>c</sup>" (which is accurate). Below that is inserted a new description of what is rightly MS Lat. XIV 110a: "Cod. CX<sup>A</sup> chart. in fol. Saec. | XVIII BIBLIOTHECA Graeca D. Marci codicum manu scriptorum per titulos digesta cum Praefatione Antonii M. Zanetti et Antonii Bongiovanni 3.II.9. Accedit Appendix manu ipsius Zanetti in qua viginti octo codices, in [...] impresso praetermissi, recensentur". There is no mention of what is now MS Lat. XIV 110b, which is the one whose appendix ("App. Novissima") I will bring to light below.

As alluded to above, "Zan. Draft" (Lat. XIV 110c) was erroneously characterised as "completed" around 1740. In April of that year, the Marciana's then librarian Lorenzo Tiepolo addressed the Republic's senate, declaring:

Li due comandi impartitimi dal Dec.o 29 S.bre 1738 di poner alle Stampe con quel Decoro, che conviene alla pubb.a dignità l'Indice manuscritto de' Libri Greci del Cardinale Bessarione, che ho già rassegnato all'Ecc.mo Senato, e di far formar l'Indice de' Manuscritti Latini del d.o Card. con unirvi tutti li altri Manuscritti, che sono nella pubb.a Libreria, essendo ora adempiuti, ho l'onore di rassegnare l'uno, e l'altro all'Ecc.mo Senato.<sup>48</sup>

Valentinelli (1872) presumes the veracity of Tiepolo's statement: "La Marciana oltracciò conserva in un suo codice ms. [...] la stessa opera apparecchiata alla stampa", though admittedly "con variazioni" (24, entry 23; emphasis mine). One hundred fifteen years after Valentinelli, the former director of the Marciana, Marino Zorzi, restated this claim in his monumental history of the *Libreria di San Marco*, "il catalogo dei codici latini, italiani, francesi era pronto per la pubblicazione, e il Tiepolo ne poteva mostrare, compiaciuto, al Senato, il manoscritto definitivo, da dare alle stampe" (Zorzi 1987, 264;

emphasis mine), though in an endnote to the chapter, he wrote, remarking on the abbreviated *praefatio* of the published version of the catalogue, “Il testo [scil. of “Zan. Draft”] era preceduto da una prefazione, assai più lunga di quella poi pubblicata [...]. Non è noto il motivo per cui la prefazione cadde” (Zorzi 1987, 494 fn. 172). Gino Levi (1906) had in fact revealed that the draft catalogue was not the same as that which would be published the following year: “Un [...] manoscritto (cod. Marciano Lat., XIV, 110) ci dà poi, con la data 1740, la redazione primitiva del catalogo, che è assai diversa dalla definitiva” (108, entry 168). Sebastiano Bisson (2008) expanded on this in his catalogue dedicated to the Marciana’s French manuscripts, commenting that “nel passaggio dal manoscritto all’edizione a stampa, si introdussero a volte nuovi errori” (VIII) and specifying in a footnote that “nell’edizione a stampa venne ridotta la *Prefatio ad lectorem* e si tralasciò di inserire gli *incipit*, presenti invece nella stesura autografa di Zanetti” (VIII fn. 8). Susy Marcon (2017) addresses the participation of Iacopo Vezzi in the composition of the Zanetti catalogues, whose name, however, “compare solamente nella prefazione dell’esemplare manoscritto datato 1740”, i.e. “Zan. Draft” (30 fn. 25). She maintains that Vezzi must have been part of the compilation of the Latin, Italian, and French volume despite the absence of his name in the published version (Marcon 2017, 30). The correlation of the absence of Vezzi’s name and the reduced preface might also suggest that Vezzi’s participation was limited to the preface, or that the considerable differences between the draft and printed versions might be due to a withdrawal from the project on the part of Vezzi before the printed catalogue’s release.

### 3.1.1        “Appendix” (“Zan. Draft”, pp. 27-84)

What caught my eye while perusing the pages of the “Zan. Draft” was the existence therein of yet another appendix. While the French codices are described in an “appendix” in Zanetti’s printed volume (“Appendice di alcuni manoscritti in lingua francese antico”, here “App. Fr. Ant”), in “Zan. Draft” the French section is labelled simply “Codici in lingua Francese antica, detta Golese”. Both the published and the draft versions of Zanetti’s Latin and Romance catalogue present appendices to the Latin collection. In the published Zanetti (1741), as noted above, the appendix regards the newly rediscovered (so-called) Petrarch manuscripts; in “Zan. Draft”, however, the appendix appears to have no real *raison d’être* as such. In fact, the majority of the entries are accompanied by the annotation “Bess.”, obviously attributing them to the original Bessarion gift; that said, several are also attributed to the Recanati and Contarini bequests, while others remain unattributed altogether. Of this appendix’s 33 descriptions, only one

corresponds to a description in the published Latin “Appendix” in Zanetti (1741), while the equivalents to another 29 are scattered about the main section of the published Latin catalogue. The “Zan. Draft” appendix’s final three descriptions are so vague, they cannot be matched with any existing entry in the published catalogues, and each is presented with exactly the same description: “CODEX DVII. [and subsequently DVIII. and DVIII.] | in fol. min. chartaceus, | fol. ... | conflatus ex variis schedulis | male simul compactis. | COLLECTIO diversimoda eruditio[n]is, in modum sylvae, ad studentis alicujus usum, ut videatur” (pp. 283-4). Even the number of folios, the knowledge of which in other cases helped me to identify the codices described, is left empty in each of these three seemingly random entries (“f. ...”).

### 3.1.2        “Addenda” (“Zan. Draft”, pp. [v-vi])

In addition to the draft’s internal “appendix”, it has at its beginning, after the “Praefatio ad lectorem” (pp. [III-V]), a section titled “Addenda” (herein “Add. Zan. Draft”) in which five more codices are described. Each entry is composed in a non-Western language (the first two in Hebrew, the second two in “serviano”, the last in Turkish) and as a result they are not included in the Zanetti editions dedicated to Greek, Latin, Italian, and French codices only; however, the first one, a Biblia Sacra, is mentioned in the published preface to Zanetti (1741) (see fn. 56 below). The Hebrew Bible and the three codices described after it in “Add. Zan. Draft” are described in Bettio’s “App. Or.”, but the fifth entry appears not to be. The five descriptions in “Add. Zan. Draft” are presented below, and the first four have been matched with the corresponding descriptions that appear in the *Appendice a Zanetti*’s “App. Or.” in footnotes (as I have done in this article’s appendix precisely for the descriptions found in “App. Novissima”). The third and fourth entries – composed in Slavic varieties – were also included in the Greek “App. Nova”, which I will further transcribe in the notes.

BIBLIA SACRA [hebraice] in folio maximo, clarissimae notae, saeculi decimi tertii. [Codicem istum pulcherrimum maximique faciendum, senex optimus Petrus Fonda Venetus, vir in forensi facultate apprime instructus, et in jure summopere versatus, largitus est Praesidi illustrissimo atque excellentissimo Laurentio Theupolo, qui secum ipse reputans, et quasi divinans quis esset largitoris animus, illo Bibliothecam donavit, talique pacto locum replvit jamdice vacuum ab alio simillimo Codice, quem olim Rempublicam hospitem Henrico III. Gallorum Regi hospiti dono disse neminem latet]<sup>49</sup>

The latter part of the description of the fifth entry, "Miraculorum Mahumedis libri VI", was carried over into "App. Novissima", only to be subsequently crossed out (see appendix herein, and in particular fn. 87):

**Miracula** Mohamedis, Arabice scripta. In fine legitur:

Libro stimatissimo da' Turchi, e trovato sopra la galea del Bassà del mar il giorno della Vittoria 1671.<sup>53</sup>

But the first part reflects what is written in the Contarini catalogue, or "Manoscritti scolastici" (hereinafter "Mss scol.") from 1714:

Sei Libri de' miracoli di Macometto, et altre cose pertinenti all'ordinazioni, e Giustizia di Cadì. Turchesco.<sup>54</sup>

A subsequent hand has added to the now-crossed-out entry in "App. Novissima" that it corresponds with App. Or. 23: "Est Codex XXXIII in Indice Codicum Arabicorum relatus, hic vero male notatus". The same hand has made that attribution in "Mss scol". too: "XXXIII. Orient". The description in "App. Or". to which this note refers reads thusly: "Cod. XXXIII. Chart. in 4.º Sæc. XVI. ff.<sup>243</sup> (*Dal Consiglio de' X. 1785 | JAHIA BEN JASCI BEN IBRAHIM. Expositio Legis Munsulmanorum, de Rebus ad Religionem spectantibus, Turcice*". Obviously the description in "App. Or". cannot refer to the manuscript described in "Add. Zan. Draft" and "App. Novissima": aside from the fact that

the descriptions show little evidence of regarding the same material, the “App. Or”. provenance given is “Dal Consiglio de’ X. 1785” (emphasis mine); the purported corresponding description appears in the “Add. Zan. Draft” of 1740. In the “App. Novissima”, its provenance has been attributed to the Contarini gift, which makes more sense given its inclusion in the 1740 “Zan. Draft” where other Contarini codices are described. In the absence of a closer description in “App. Or”. – especially given how closely the other descriptions in “App. Novissima” resemble corresponding descriptions in the wider *Appendice a Zanetti* – and given the fact that the entry in “App. Novissima” has been crossed out, the codex described therein and in “Add. Zan. Draft” must be presumed lost or otherwise dispersed.

While the official Zanetti and post-Zanetti catalogues separate these five manuscripts, the cohesion of “Add. Zan. Draft” lies in Tiepolo’s having mentioned them all in his relation to the Venetian Senate of 16 April 1740 (referenced above) outside of his commentary on the manuscripts described in the Zanetti editions. He starts by giving the background and history of the acquisition of the Hebrew Bible (Ris. 113, 185-7). He subsequently cites “Un libro in foglio in lingua ebraica Rabinica, nel quale vi sono due libri deli quattordici de’ Canoni di Rabbi Moisè d’Egitto d.º il Maimonide, che trattano de re uxoria de casibus gradibusque in copula prohibentibus, de cibis vetricis, de mactatione animalium | L’Apocalissi di S. Giovanni in lingua Serviana, | Altro in lingua Serviana sopra varie feste, e ferie, ed | Altro in lingua Turca” (Ris. 113, 187). Zanetti (1741) provides an abridged account of the history of the Hebrew Bible provided by Tiepolo. Zorzi (1987, 267) writes of the last four in particular together:

il Tiepolo ricorda un gruppo di codici di cui non era stato in grado di determinare ‘il tempo e il modo che sono stati collocati in pubblica Libreria’: i due ‘in lingua serviana’ (forse, come si è accennato, acquisiti all’epoca del Venier), uno ebraico e uno turco.

The two Slavic codices appear not to provene from the “Decreto del Senato 1719” (as indicated in “App. Nova” and “App. Or.”), but rather, according to Pelusi’s (1991, 50-5) research,<sup>55</sup> from the Recanati

gift, along with so many others that make up the old Greek, Latin, Italian, and French *fonds*.

The early presence of the five cited codices attested, in sum, by Tiepolo's mention of them among the Marciana manuscripts in 1740 and their inclusion in the "Add. Zan. Draft", also from 1740, by the history of the Hebrew Bible given in Zanetti (1741), by the inclusion of the Turkish codex in the "App. Novissima" (as brief as its time there may have been before being stricken), in addition to its attestation in Contarini's catalogue from 1714 ("Mss scol."), and by the Slavic manuscripts' documentation in the Recanati archives (Pelusi 1991, 50-5, 64-72), shines light on the even-greater diversity of codices of which the Marciana was in possession already in the first half of the eighteenth century and at the time of the Zanetti editions.

### **3.2 The Two 26th Manuscripts of the Fondo Francese Antico: App. Str. 8 and 23**

#### **3.2.1 The "Two 26th Manuscripts" in the Recanati and Contarini Inventories and "App. Novissima"**

Though "App. Novissima" is fairly evenly distributed between Latin and Italian codex descriptions, there is, nevertheless, one *French* manuscript described in it, which may have been overlooked by Zanetti when he composed his "Appendice di alcuni manoscritti in lingua francese antica". The descriptions in "App. Novissima" are sometimes identical to, sometimes similar to, and only rarely completely divergent from, the corresponding descriptions scattered about the various parts of the relative volumes of the *Appendice a Zanetti* – which is no surprise given that, as mentioned above, Bettio appears to have drawn much of his initial material precisely from "App. Novissima". The lone French entry in "App. Novissima" (Cod. XXXVII) reads thusly: "Il romanzo della Rosa, in lingua Francese antica"; the corresponding entry in the *Appendice a Zanetti*, and namely that referred to today as App. Str. 8, reads: "Le Roman de la Rose (y manqué le commencement). Aguraçes cinque, li qual se fisient cinque Cevaleris zascun por soi mesme". This manuscript is attested in the two Recanati inventories along with the majority of the French codices that are described in Zanetti's published edition. In these we read:<sup>56</sup>

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"Evangelistario in Sclavo Latino. L'Apocalisse di San Giovanni. Precetti del Decalogo, senza fine in 8°" (Pelusi 1991, 50, 61 fn. 79, 70, 72). Pelusi concludes, "Giambattista Recanati legava dunque alla Libreria di San Marco i primi due codici in lingua paleoslava che questa avesse mai posseduto, dal momento della sua fondazione" (50).

Given that this codex had belonged to the Recanati collection not long before its having passed into the possession of the Marciana, and given its inclusion in “App. Novissima” penned sometime shortly after the publication of the Zanetti catalogue, one must presume that it was either simply overlooked by Zanetti and Bongiovanni at the time of their undertaking, or that it was on loan and returned sometime thereafter. In this light, it would rightfully be considered the 26th codex in the Fondo Francese Antico.

In the same copy of Zanetti’s published volume to which “App. Novissima” was added (Lat. XIV 110b [= 4532]), someone – by my estimation Zanetti – penned in after the last printed manuscript description in “App. Fr. Ant.”<sup>57</sup> another entry by hand: “CODICE XXVI. C.III. Contarini | Poesie Francesi antiche”. The 26th manuscript description penned in here supplies a vaguer account of the referent manuscript than those dedicated to many of Zanetti’s first 25; however, it is accompanied by information regarding the manuscript’s potential collocation (“C.III”, which is now an antiquated system)<sup>58</sup> and provenance (“Contarini”), which is information not *printed* in the Zanetti catalogue in relation to the codices described therein. After the words “Poesie Francesi antiche”, there is additional information, as if the continuation of the original entry; yet, it appears written in pencil and in a different hand: “Sono un Romanzo Morale Francese, mancante al principio ed al fine”. Then, at a subsequent time, a two-line-sized parenthesis with “Passato nella Giunta dei Francesi al N.<sup>o</sup> X-III” was inked in. Each of the last parts of the description appears to be

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(attributed again to Zeno), and the final one from 1734 (attributed to Verdani) (Bisson 2008, XIII-XIV). The second inventory neglects the French manuscripts and is therefore not cited here. The first and third are abbreviated here as “Rec.<sub>1</sub>” and “Rec.<sub>3</sub>”, respectively. As mentioned above, a fourth inventory was drawn up once Recanati’s library had passed to the Marciana, but it contains no relevant descriptions. See fn. 26 above for source information. The manuscript sources are often cited by scholars, but Ciampoli 1900 did publish Rec.<sub>1</sub> and Rec.<sub>3</sub>. The latter was actually composed in 1734, not in 1736, despite what the manuscript title seems to suggest (“Anno MDCCXXXVI”) (Bisson 2008, XIV fn. 26).

in Bettio's hand. A look at both the Zanetti catalogue available in the Marciana's manuscript reading room and at the one in which "App. Novissima" was inserted (Lat. IX 110b) reveals that the same hand penned in collocation and provenance information for each of the entries in the Zanetti edition (where the provenance was known or suspected). That hand is Bettio's. In the 23<sup>rd</sup> entry of the Marciana's official "French" and "foreign" section of the *Appendice a Zanetti* ("App. Str."), one once again reads the words "un romanzo morale francese, mancante al principio ed al fine".<sup>59</sup> What appears to be the same hand has identified a description in the inventory of the bequest of Giacomo Contarini ("Mss scol."), entered into the possession of the Marciana in 1713, with "Giunta ai Fr. XXIII" (f. 56v.), or App. Str. 23 (= 267), which matches with what is written after the initial description of the penned-in description of "CODICE XXVI" at the end of "App. Fr. Ant". in MS Lat. XIV 110b.

It should be remembered, however, that the original penned-in entry states simply, "Poesie Francesi antiche", while the remaining descriptions, which point to the current App. Str. 23 (*Les échecs amoureux* [Bisson 2008, 135-7]), were added subsequently. It has been brought to light elsewhere that in the just-referenced Contarini inventory, there are three descriptions that regard French manuscripts. I have copied them below:

1. f. 54r: "Testamentum Novum ex Collectione B. Hieronymi cum Traductione Gallica. In pergameno"
2. f. 55r: "Versi in Franc.e senza nome [...] In perg.a"
3. f. 56v: "Libro in Versi Franc.e senza principio e fine"

The first has been identified as Lat. 10, which Zanetti describes as "Testamentum novum, cum notis marginalibus Gallico idiomate scriptis". Curiously, Zanetti initially analysed it among the French manuscripts in his draft, but then moved it to the Latin section for the edition ultimately published. The third entry above has been identified as the App. Str. 23 recently discussed. The second of the three listed here, however, eludes identification. It has been posited elsewhere that it may in fact refer to Fr. 14 (see Reynolds 2012), but the evidence provided is far from conclusive. What is known, however, is that the Recanati and the Contarini inventories were likely available to Zanetti, his collaborators, and his successors. In Zanetti's published catalogue (1741), he wrote that the French manuscripts therein described "furono riposti nella nostra Libreria per testamento di

Giovambatista Recanati” (256). It is not accurate to say that of all of them, and Zanetti says as much in two occasions: he writes that neither MSS Fr. 24 nor 25 came from among the Recanati manuscripts, though he is wrong with respect to Fr. 24 (Reynolds 2012, 206); he does not make an exception of Fr. 1, though it has subsequently been attributed to the Contarini gift (Bisson 2008, 5). Of the above three French manuscripts listed in Contarini, the first was ultimately described in the *Latin* section of Zanetti (1741); the third in the *Appendice a Zanetti*; and, while the second may be attributed to Fr. XIV, there is no great evidence to sustain that.

### 3.2.2 The “Two 26th Manuscripts” in Morelli’s *Zibaldoni* and Sainte-Palaye’s *Notices*

It has been asserted that in studying the history of the Marciana’s Old French manuscripts, one must not rely on Zanetti’s printed catalogue due to its errors and omissions, though his exemplar is even more incomplete and unreliable at least with regard to the old French codices. Another document of note is a series of pages composed in French found among Jacopo Morelli’s *zibaldoni*<sup>60</sup> that suggest that what Zanetti printed relative to the Biblioteca’s French manuscripts is not in fact his composition, but rather an Italian translation of observations on the Marciana’s French collection provided by the eighteenth-century French *académicien* Jean-Baptiste de La Curne de Sainte-Palaye.<sup>61</sup> The pages from Morelli’s *zibaldoni* that have been attributed (either directly or indirectly) to Sainte-Palaye are physically different, in material substance and in size, compared with the rest of Morelli’s *zibaldoni*. Grouped together with these French-language pages are other notes that similarly pertain to the Marciana’s Old French codices, though written on paper consistent with the majority of the *zibaldoni* and that do appear to be Morelli’s own.<sup>62</sup> They are mostly brief, and by and large incomplete; the first few have some commentary, the majority have only the estimated century of composition, and some are neglected altogether. In fact, there is nothing written at all for the Fondo Antico’s last catalogued manuscript, Fr. 25; immediately after Fr. 24, however, one reads about a

26th codex: "XXVI. sec. XIV Credo sia il romanzo della Rosa. | è da confrontare col codice segnato C.IV.4". (c. 304v). The old shelfmark system's "C.IV.4" would in fact become App. Str. 23, which is what the notes added by hand to the printed French Zanetti appendix in the codex containing "App. Novissima" say that that catalogue's no. 26 ("Poesie francesi antiche") had become ("Passato nella Giunta dei Francesi al N.<sup>o</sup> XXIII"). However, the description in Morelli's *zibaldoni* regards a manuscript containing a version of the *Roman de la rose*, which is the manuscript now signalled in the *Appendice a Zanetti* as App. Str. 8 and, presumably, as the lone French codex described in "App. Novissima" introduced above.

### 3.3 Other Early French Manuscripts not Catalogued in Zanetti (1741)

In sum, the penned-in "26th Codex" of the "Appendice di alcuni manoscritti in lingua francese antico" in the copy of Zanetti (1741) contained in the Marciana's MS Lat. XIV 110b is to be identified with the manuscript that is now accepted as App. Str. 23 (= 267), "Les échecs amoureux". Morelli's "26th Codex" is a "Romanzo della rosa", now identified as App. Str. 8 (= 238), and also listed as "Codice XXXVII" of "App. Novissima" appended to the same version of Zanetti's catalogue in MS Lat. XIV 110c. It is not clear why exactly Morelli suggests comparing these two, for there seems to be nothing connecting them, other than the fact that they were both in the possession of the Marciana at an early date, though not registered in the Zanetti catalogue.

Alongside the 25 manuscripts that make up the "Fondo Francese Antico", therefore, the earliest phases of the Marciana's French collection must also have included the aforementioned App. Str. 23 (provenance: Contarini) and App. Str. 8 (provenance: Recanati), and so each has been treated by early scholars of the Marciana's Old French manuscript corpus as a true extension of Zanetti's initial grouping, as a rightful "Fr. 26", so to speak. In addition to these, App. Str. 10 (= 262), *Régime du corps* by Aldobrandino da Siena (Bisson 2008, 120-2), may also have entered into the Marciana collection early on without having been detected for inclusion in either the Recanati inventories or the Zanetti catalogues, or the "App. Novissima". Some believe that this manuscript is inventoried among the Gonzaga codices that would eventually be acquired by Recanati, but the 1407 Gonzaga inventory would be the last trace of it before it re-emerged to be registered in the *Appendice a Zanetti*, where its provenance is conjectured as Recanati's collection (indicated as a question: "Recanati?"). Bisson (2008) has posited that the aforementioned entry in the Gonzaga inventory does not, in fact, correspond to App. Str. 10,

so its place among the Marciana French codices remains to be determined (122). One last manuscript rounds out the French corpus in the possession of the Marciana circa the 1740s but not published in Zanetti's French appendix, namely the aforementioned "Nouveau Testament". It was in fact published in Zanetti, though among the Latin codices as *Lat. 10*. This "Nouveau Testament" is attested in the Contarini inventory and in the French section of "Zan. Draft", as well as in the documents ascribed to Sainte-Palaye bound among Morelli's personal notes, with the title "Nouveau Testament en latin avec la Traduction en vieux françois a costé".<sup>63</sup>

## 4 Conclusion and Introduction to the “Appendix Novissima”

### 4.1 Conclusion

I have provided here a thorough picture of the various phases in cataloguing the Marciana's Latin, Italian, and French (and to some extent Greek) manuscripts, drawing from well-studied and official sources (Zanetti 1740 and 1741 and the *Appendice a Zanetti*), from pre-Zanetti published sources (Tomasini), from well-known and lesser-known archival sources from before the Zanetti editions (Gonzaga, Recanati, and Contarini inventories; Tiepolo's and Sainte-Palaye's writings; and the Zanetti draft), and from post-Zanetti – but pre-*Appendice a Zanetti* – written material (Morelli's *zibaldoni*, the “Appendix Nova”, and the “Appendix Novissima”). While the core of this study focuses on the French collection as an appendage to the Latin and Italian collections, it also sheds some light on the histories of the earliest Hebrew, Slavic, and Turkish codices to have entered into the Marciana's treasures. I hope to underscore here the importance of the Zanetti Draft in studying the history of the Marciana's Latin and Romance manuscript patrimony, and in particular the ways in which its contents differ from those of the published 1741 Zanetti edition.

Zanetti got right to work in ensuring, shortly after his catalogues had been printed, the continued tracking of the Marciana's new-acquisition manuscripts and the correction of errors committed in the preparation of the published catalogues. The realization of these toils would not be manifest until one of Zanetti's successors, Pietro Bettio, finally instituted the *Appendice a Zanetti* as an official mechanism of the Marciana's organization. Prior to that, Jean-Baptiste-Gaspard d'Ansse de Villoison had published Zanetti's earliest revisions relative to the Greek codices in the form of the “Appendix Nova” in 1781. Scarcely a word has ever been uttered, however, about Zanetti's Latin and Italian “Appendix Novissima”, which, like “App. Nova”, gives us a view onto the earliest phases of the development of the *Appendice a Zanetti*, while Zanetti was still alive and active.

### 4.2 Introduction to “App. Novissima”

It is this “App. Novissima” that I present below as a relatively diplomatic rendition of its contents. The transcription includes the initial descriptions and most of the later annotations present in the manuscript, most of which can be attributed to the hand of Pietro Bettio. These annotations resemble those that appear in any number of other archival documents pertaining to the codices in the Marciana's

possession. I have matched each entry in the “App. Novissima” with its corresponding entry in the *Appendice a Zanetti*, which are spread across the Latin (“App. Lat.”), Italian (“App. It.”), French / foreign (“App. Str.”), and non-Western (“App. Or.”) volumes of the *Appendice*, and especially the Latin and Italian ones.

I employ a mildly different system in the notes to refer to manuscript entries in the *Appendice a Zanetti* and elsewhere in large part because the collocation numbers assigned to the manuscripts are generally expressed in the text of the entries that I am providing. So the collocation number that I provide outside of the transcription stops before the manuscript number; what’s more, to distinguish from references to entries in the published Zanetti editions (Zanetti 1740 and 1741), I spell out more explicitly that I am citing the entry in the *Appendice a Zanetti* (**App. Zan.**), the language abbreviation (e.g. **Lat.**), and the class number in roman numerals (e.g. **Cl. I**; here with “Cl.” to underscore that the Roman numeral does not refer to the manuscript number but to the class). See for example the first reference to *Appendice a Zanetti* below: **App. Zan. Lat., Cl. I:** “Cod. X. Membr. in 4.<sup>o</sup> maj. XIV. Saec”. The reference to MS 10 is made within in the entry (“Cod. X.”); in the analysis above, this might be otherwise referred to abbreviatedly as “MS Lat. I 10”.

Original entries in each source (“App. Novissima” and *Appendice a Zanetti*) are generally transcribed in regular text, whereas subsequent annotations and alterations are transcribed in italics. Text that has been crossed out in the sources is generally transcribed here and struck through (for example: struck-through text). Where text has been added above or below text with which it is associated, it is usually transcribed in super- or subscript. Meaningful line breaks are either reproduced here or, as is normally the case in the notes, indicated with vertical lines (|). There are a few occasions where I make additional reference to sources outside of the *Appendice a Zanetti*. Any commentary on my part, needless to say, is contained within the notes; all information provided in the text is transcribed as I have seen it from the original source, including obvious errors. On rare occasions, there is text that is simply illegible, which I indicate with ellipses ([...]). I am hopeful that readers will identify footnote references as such, and not as contents of the entries themselves.
